

Affidavit of Support for Visa — Stamp Paper Format, Notarisation & Sample

What an officer checks in this document — and what gets it refused.

What this document must contain

Executed on non-judicial stamp paper of the value your state prescribes, in the deponent's name. It states the deponent's full name, age, parentage and address; their relationship to the applicant; the applicant's full name and passport number; the specific purpose and duration of the funding; the amount or scope of support being undertaken; and a declaration that the contents are true. It is signed by the deponent in the presence of a notary, who stamps, signs and enters it in their register. It is submitted with the deponent's income proof — ITR, bank statements, and salary or business evidence.

Do

- Check whether the mission actually requires an affidavit
- Use stamp paper of the value your state prescribes
- Sign in the notary's presence, not before
- Annex ITR and bank statements to the affidavit itself
- State the scope of support specifically, not as “all expenses”

Do not

- Don't swear an affidavit where a letter was asked for
- Don't leave the amount or duration open-ended
- Don't use a deponent whose income cannot support the undertaking
- Don't submit it unsigned by the notary or without a register number
- Don't reuse an old affidavit for a new application

Mistakes that get this document refused

- Affidavit sworn for a mission that never asked for one
- Notarised but with no register number or notary seal visible on the scan
- Support described as “all expenses” with no figure and no duration
- Deponent's declared income unsupported by the annexed ITR
- Applicant's name or passport number does not match the passport exactly
