

Visa Documents for Farmers — Jamabandi, J-Forms & Proving Income Without an ITR

What an officer checks in this document — and what gets it refused.

What this document must contain

Land first: Jamabandi or record of rights showing your holding, with Khasra–Khatauni and the land revenue receipt. Then cultivation: Girdawari, the crop inspection record, showing what was actually grown. Then sale: J-Forms from the mandi, which are the arhtiya's record of your produce being sold, and which function as your income statement. Then money: the bank passbook or statement showing those sale proceeds arriving. Everything in a regional language needs an English translation. Where you do file a return — many farmers have other income — include it.

Do

- Say in writing why there is no ITR — cite section 10(1)
- Get every Punjabi or Hindi document translated to English
- Order the file: land, cultivation, sale, money
- Include J-Forms — they are your income statement
- Show sale proceeds arriving in the bank passbook

Do not

- Don't leave the missing ITR unexplained
- Don't submit untranslated revenue records
- Don't send land papers alone with no sale or bank evidence
- Don't inflate landholding beyond what the Jamabandi shows
- Don't let a family member's land stand in for your own without explaining the relationship

Mistakes that get this document refused

- Submitting the file with no explanation for the absent ITR
- Revenue records in Punjabi with no English translation
- Land documents with nothing showing the land is actually farmed
- No J-Forms, so there is no record of produce being sold
- Bank passbook showing no agricultural credits at all
